COME ON FEB. 8 10:00 am - MEETING WITH YOUTH LEADERS ACROSS BORDERS

Strangers No Longer is taking the lead on a weeklong educational tour that will bring four young people from Central America and Mexico to SE Michigan. The youth leaders will share their stories in high schools, universities, parishes, house meetings and communities. Youth leaders from Mexico who have experienced the pain of deportation will share their stories— and how they have come to defend the rights of deported people in Mexico. From El Salvador, we will be joined by

creative young activists who are using urban art and music to provide alternatives to gangs and protect at-risk children and youth in one of San Salvador's most marginalized neighborhoods. To schedule a visit to your house meeting or community, call Bill O'Brien, 313-549-0421.

The tour will build connections between young people in Michigan and their peers from Mexico and Central America, seeking to promote understanding and solidarity across borders. By engaging on a personal level, participants will deepen their understanding of the factors that are causing so many people to leave their home countries, and the pain that is experienced by children, youth, and families who are caught the ever-more aggressive immigration enforcement systems that are causing families to live in fear, and that have resulted in many people being returned to Mexico or Central America.

COME ON FEB. 8 11:00 am - MICHIGAN DRIVER'S LICENSE CAMPAIGN KICKOFF

At the February 8th meeting, you will also learn about The Strangers No Longer MI driver's license task force which is kicking off a campaign in support of the Drive SAFE bills (Senate bills 631, 632 and House bills 5192, 5193.) These bills will allow drivers licenses and state ID cards for all Michigan residents—including undocumented immigrants. Right now, the bills are stuck in committees with no scheduled debates

The right to get a driver's license for the undocumented without proof of citizenship or permanent residency was allowed in Michigan until 2008. Since then, immigrants without a form of



identification haven't been able to do simple things like buy prescription medicine, enroll their children in programs that require parents' ID, or even get a library card. The Drive SAFE bills are supported by 32 organizations across the state including the Michigan Farm Bureau and the Michigan Catholic Conference.

Here is a quote from Tom Hickson, Michigan Catholic Conference Vice President for Public Policy, September 20, 2019:

"Transportation is vital to nearly every aspect of life, and to have good transportation access, you need a driver's license. The inability to obtain a license makes life's most basic functions extremely difficult. Most of us take for granted life's routine tasks, such as driving to work, going to a doctor's appointment, taking a child to school, going to church, or picking up groceries...

All of these situations require a driver's license. Prohibiting individuals from gaining access to a driver's license robs them not only of their human dignity but it also hurts the community... For these reasons, the Michigan Catholic Conference is proud to stand here today to discuss this issue and looks forward to a robust discussion on this important human dignity issue in the Michigan Legislature"

SNL Circles from St. Mary Student Parish in Ann Arbor and Our Mother of Perpetual Help Parish in Ferndale and Oak Park are leading the task force to get these bills passed.

What can you do? With your Circle, meet with the state Senator and Representative from your district to communicate your support for these bills. Be ready to discuss the benefits of these bills including: improved public safety, agriculture labor benefits, additional revenue for Michigan in license fees, etc.

We have an information packet regarding the bills and their benefits to help you prepare for the meetings. We can also come to your next Circle meeting to present this topic in more detail.

JOIN HUMAN RIGHTS/ENVIRONMENT DELEGATION TO HONDURAS

SNL leader Sr. Rosemary Abate, HVM, shares this (MAY 27) request which came through the Leadership Conference of Women Religious:



Dear friends of Fr. Melo and the human and environmentalist defenders of Honduras,

Please help us find delegates to join the May 27 to June 3rd Delegation to Honduras to support the freedom of the Guapinol 8.

This morning another caravan left San Pedro Sula to the United States. They will face the "New Wall" of military at the Guatemala-Mexico border. But the conditions they are escaping are much worse: just in the first two weeks of January 2020, 15 women have been assassinated; 380 femicides in 2019, more than one per day.

The government of Juan Orlando responded with **more repression** after his brother was found quilty of narcotraffic charges in a New York court.

After four months, Our Guapinol-8 continues in jail for defending the Guapinol River. They are asking for our solidarity and accompaniment. We are appealing to you to help us find delegates to join the May 27 to June 3rd delegation to Honduras.

UPDATE ON CESAR CUELLAR AND HIS FAMILY

Cesar Cuellar and his wife and son arrived in the Detroit area in 2017. The SNL Circle at Gesu Catholic Church has helped the family since they arrived. We checked in with Cesar to see how he and his family are doing. They are expecting their second child in a few weeks.

Where are you and your family living?

We are living in Detroit, two blocks from the GESU church.

Are you working?

Yes, I work as an IT coordinator at the GESU school and church. This is because I have a work permit that was issued to me thanks to the asylum process that we have opened for our family since 2017.

How do you and your family like being here?

We are definitely happy despite the great changes, but taking into account that in El Salvador you do not live, survive, leave that feeling behind and all the stress that generates the possibility of being a victim of gang violence is liberating. But also the fact of migrating and leaving everything behind is not easy, especially when people do not have family or any type of permit that allows you to develop normally.

How are people helping you?

As I have always said, Gesu and the Circle of Support that exists in this community have helped us in many aspects of life, initially with housing, then with food and things for our house. But above all that what changed our lives and brought us joy was that they made us feel part of their community, they made us feel welcome, since they quickly ceased to be "the circle of support", to become our friends of Gesu.

Are you in touch with people back home?

Yes, the whole family of my wife Carmen is in El Salvador. I for my part, my whole family has lived in the United States for many years.

When will your new baby be born?

Thank God, we had the blessing of being able to have our son Cedric at home without any complications, and with Camilo, our new baby is in the same process, he already has 37 weeks with what is soon to be born in the next 3 weeks, although Carmen thinks it will be in the next 10 days.

Is there anything you would like to add?

Personally as a migrant, there is nothing that costs more to overcome than the rejection and injustice of some people who, thanks to the media traditions of communication, think that we have come to this country to violate or abuse it, but in most cases this is not the case, we are migrants who want a better place to raise our children, a place to live with

dignity, where they can grow up in an environment free of social, economic or environmental violence, but above all live far from corruption that causes so much damage to society and that is the great sickness in Central America, especially in the northern triangle (Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador). Gangs are the result of all the abuse committed by corrupt politicians who have looted our countries to enrich themselves, and as you know in the eyes of the international community, the apparent problem of our countries is gangs, when these are simply the result of the corruption that has never been prosecuted and judged as it deserves, and as long as this does not change, people will not stop fleeing from poor conditions in every way, social, economic and currently environmental.

REFLECTIONS ON FAMILIES IN FLIGHT HOLY HOUR AT MOST HOLY TRINITY

On Saturday, January 11, Strangers No Longer began its Campaign for Prayer and Fasting for Families in Flight. The theme of Families in Flight coincided with the Feast of the Epiphany and the Flight of the Holy Family into Egypt. The goal of these Holy Hours is to call attention to the plight of those seeking refuge in our country, to educate people about the reality of the immigration crisis, and to challenge members of the Circles of Support to pray and fast in support of migrants and refugees.

This first Holy Hour was a very moving and multicultural experience, involving Las Guadalupanas (A Women's Society from Most Holy Trinity and St. Anne's parishes dedicated to Our Lady of Guadalupe); and Los Matachines, a group of families dedicated to re-enacting traditional Aztec dance and music to honor Our Lady of Guadalupe.



The Holy Hour remembered the seven children who died while in U.S. Detention Centers in 2019. Following an incense bearer, Shirlene Smith of Gesu Parish, seven members of Las Guadalupanas carried photographs of the children. Amelia Matta read each child's name, age and country of origin in English and Spanish as the photos were placed on the altar. Los Matachines completed the opening ceremony with a spectacular performance involving dance and drums.

To highlight the reality of the immigration experience, Poet Michael McLauchlan read a an original poem on the theme of immigration, which was followed by a heart-rending testimony by Luz Ramos, who walked and hitchhiked 1,200 miles with her two children to escape violence and persecution in Guatemala. Irma Landin-Obregon skillfully provided the English translation of her testimony.

Following a reading of the Gospel of Matthew, Sister Nina Rodriguez of St. Anne's Parish, offered a moving reflection, reminding us that Jesus was an immigrant and calling the congregation to work on behalf of migrants and refugees, and to advocate for change in our nation's Immigration Policies. Her reflection concluded with a procession of children who carried roses to the altar, which were then placed at Our Lady of Guadalupe's Shrine.

We gratefully acknowledge the support and participation of Msgr. Charles Kosanke, Pastor of Most Holy Trinity and St. Anne's, and the Holy Hour Planning Committee members, including Mary Turner, Amelia Mata, Helena Solano, Alanna Reyes Ali, Teresa Moncivais, Sister Nina Rodriquez, CSJ, Irma Landin-Obregon, Tom Haggerty, Bill O'Brien, Kathleen Rogers, Sharon Bender, and Sister Rosemarie Abate, SHVM, and all of those Most Holy Trinity and St. Anne's parishioners who came and volunteered to make this first Holy Hour a beautiful event.

UPDATE ON CAMPAIGN TO SUPPORT SHELTER IN MEXICO BY MOTHER OF PERPETUAL HELP PARISH

The Circle at Our Mother of Perpetual Help (OMOPH) kicked off a campaign to support the Casa Samaritano Shelter in Hidalgo, Mexico after Masses during the weekend of December 7th and 8h. The event was well received by the parish. About 40 parishioners stayed for a presentation about the shelter. It is run by 5 Sisters of the Sacred Heart and strives to provide food, clean clothing, and showers to hundreds of people migrating north.

The Sisters have a budget of about \$57,000 per year which they are always struggling to meet. The Circle at Our Mother of Perpetual Help was able to collect \$2,625 that weekend and expect an additional \$1,240 in pledges over this year. Our Mother of Perpetual Help is in the process of planning a Families in Flight Holy Hour in March with other churches in the area. The plan is for funds collected at this holy hour to be donated to Casa Samaritano as well.
